Steinbeck House

Echo Park, 1930 Architect unknown

This good house in the old Los Angeles neighborhood of Echo Park, near Dodger Stadium and what was once Chavez Ravine, was built for Henry Steinbeck, cousin of *The Grapes of Wrath* author John Steinbeck, in 1930 as part of a planned development of small Spanish Revival houses. As a result of the Great Depression, the development was halted, and the building records have disappeared. Only this and one other house in the plan were completed. Spanish-style bungalows were built all over Southern California at the time, but this hillside example is not typical and it has really been brought to life with numerous decorative embellishments and additions by its enthusiastic current owners.

With the exception of the original stenciled beams, all the decorative painting in the house was done by Michael Uhlenkott, who also designed the new decorative tile in the house, Above: View of the rear facade from the pool area
